Our Master of Arts program in History offers advanced training in United States and global history.

This program is designed to appeal to a wide range of students, ranging from social studies teachers who need a master's degree for professional certification to those seeking advanced preparation for a wide variety of careers from public service to non-profit management. We provide a strong grounding in historical knowledge, public engagement, and advanced skills in research, analysis, and writing.

Our three-term, 32-credit program features a variety of courses which explore how histories intersect across continents and chronological eras. We emphasize an appreciation of diverse histories from a variety of social, cultural, geographic, economic, and religious perspectives. Students work in consultation with their advisor to select a personalized set of courses that will help to best advance their career or personal interests.

Our students commit to one of two program tracks, leading to the completion of an Exit Portfolio.

Thesis Track

Students complete 8 credits of a directed thesis.

Project/Professional Track

This option involves the completion of a special project in one of the following sub-tracks. The project will be determined in consultation with the student's advisor and related to the student's degree goals. The portfolio will consist of aggregated student-created materials.

- Sub-track 1: Teaching project. This may be linked to a graduate teaching assistantship or practicum. Or it might involve the development of course materials for a university-level course, pedagogical writings, or other related research projects.
- Sub-track 2: Public history project. This may be linked to an internship, a Digital Humanities project, a public history project, or other options in consultation with the advisor.

FINANCING YOUR STUDIES

Our tuition costs are competitive, and we offer scholarships and Teaching Assistantships to qualified students.

This scholarship (\$1,000 per academic year) is available on an annual basis to any student enrolled in the Master of Arts program in History at the State University of New York at Geneseo who has applied and been admitted as a degree candidate. Preference is given to graduate students specializing in United States History and exhibiting an interest in history education.



APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

Our online application process allows admission on a rolling basis.

To apply, submit the following through our easy online application form:

- application fee
- official transcripts
- letters of recommendation from two persons who can attest to the academic potential for graduate study and personal character of the applicant, one of which must be completed by a faculty member
- CV or resume
- one-to-two-page personal statement
- writing sample of no more than 15 pages
