# Greetings from the Department of Political Science and International Relations!

Dear Alumni,

Now in my second year as chair of the Department of Political Science and International Relations, I could not be more proud of all that our faculty, students, and alumni accomplished in 2024. This newsletter highlights some of these achievements.

The political science and international relations faculty continue to raise the bar on research, teaching, and service at Geneseo and the larger academic community. Professor Anand Rao gave a talk at Oxford University's Nissan Seminar about Japan's immigration policies. Professor Raslan Ibrahim was recognized as outstanding faculty by Geneseo's Student Association (SA), an honor coming from the students themselves. Professor Hanna Brant was promoted, chaired the search for our new faculty member, and organized a panel on the 2024 election that helped inform the campus about the stakes of last year's presidential race. Meanwhile, Professor Aaron Herold wrapped up his fellowship at Princeton University and shared his research on Tocqueville and the current rise in revolutionary thinking both at Geneseo, and as an invited speaker at the University of Baltimore. Finally, the department is thrilled to welcome a new member of our faculty, Professor Jeonghwa Yang, whose expertise is on coordinated responses to natural disasters. Our students have been recognized as outstanding not just at Geneseo, with their induction into Phi Beta Kappa, but also across all of the State University of New York (SUNY) system. We're so proud of political science major Laura Wright '24, who was selected for the 2024 Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence. Our Model UN Club continues to be active in conferences across the northeast, and our Political Affairs Club advances the careers of our students by traveling to DC and hosting guest speakers. YouTube, Reddit, 4Chan, Gab, Gettr, Truth Social, Telegram, and TikTok). These studies show that candidates are leveraging different platforms to communicate with different audiences, and also show the rise of alt-tech platforms as an alternative, digital space for conspiracies and election fraud discourse to flourish. Dr. Lukito discussed the increasing use of computational methods in political communication research. She also met with graduating political science students prior to the talk to discuss graduate school and other avenues for post-undergraduate career planning.

Dr. Lukito is an Assistant Professor at the University of Texas at Austin's School of Journalism and Media. She studies cross-platform media language in the global political communication context, focusing especially on interactions between news and different social media platforms. Dr. Lukito specializes in natural language processing and quantitative language analysis methods to study language over time.

Dr. Lukito's ongoing work studies political mis- and disinformation, including the impact of Russian disinformation on political

communication ecologies more broadly. She has discussed her research in *Columbia Journalism Review* and on CNN; this research was also cited in Robert Mueller's 2018 report. Dr. Lukito also studies live-tweeting, economic news coverage, public diplomacy, and U.S. news coverage about foreign policy. She publishes extensively in peer-reviewed journals such as The International Journal of Press/Politics, Political Communication, and Information, Communication & Society.

Dr. Lukito received her Ph.D from the University of Wisconsin Madison in 2020, where she also earned Ph.D minors in English Linguistics and Political Science (International Relations and Quantitative Methods). Our department thanks Dr. Lukito for sharing her expertise and experiences with our students! We encourage all of our alumni to visit our campus and share their inspiring and informative work with us!





#### DONOR PROFILE: C.C. Christakos '83

Christakos graduated from SUNY Geneseo with her B.A. degree in Political Science in 1983 and earned an MPA degree from The American University School of Public Affairs in 1992 where she was named a Presidential Management Fellow. Christakos built her career in the Federal Government landing her first job at the U.S. Supreme Court. She has also worked at the U.S. Office of Personnel Management where she authored the legislation creating the Transportation Security Administration (TSA). She is currently a Senior Legislative Liaison in the Office of Congressional and Intergovernmental Affairs at the US Department of Labor.

Christakos has been actively involved as a volunteer with various alumni initiatives. She served on the DC Regional Alumni Committee from 2010-2019.

She regularly attends regional events, has been an externship host, and a GOLD Leadership speaker. Christakos has been awarded the Alumni Association's Distinguished Service Award in

2010. She has also volunteered in her community, devoting more than thirty years to the Junior League of Washington, including serving as its President in 2003-2004.

Her lifetime giving comes to \$18,000 almost entirely directed to the Department of Political Science and International Relations, and it is our honor to highlight her generosity and achievements. Christakos also has a \$10,000 planned gift

The presentations were followed by a question and answer period, moderated by Political Science major, Lexi Savoie '24. This event was made possible by generous grant funding from Pi Sigma Alpha National Political Science Honor Society. We thank the hardworking members of the Honor Society who helped to coordinate, our Department faculty who oversaw the student-lead planning, as well as our passionate speakers who extended their time to ensure our student body remains educated on this ongoing conflict.

global conflict. This is an especially important aim, in the wake of political misinformation across social media platforms about the region that is today Israel and Palestine. In scholarly settings, the overarching objective is always to explain and understand a set of events rather than provide justification for any group's actions.

The University Police Department was contacted during the planning stages of the event, and we thank them for sending two officers who attended, to aid should any issues have arisen. We thank our student attendees for remaining respectful throughout the event and making this added security simply a precaution. We are proud that Geneseo has fostered a comfortable and safe environment of learning for all to engage with sensitive topics.

#### **About the Speakers**

Dr. Ibrahim is a Professor of Political Science and International Relations here at Geneseo. His research and teaching interests include International Politics of the Middle East, the Arab-Israeli Conflict, International Relations Theory, Sovereignty, and Human Rights. Dr. Ibrahim was a Post-Doctoral Fellow at the Pontifical Catholic University of Rio de Janeiro (Brazil) and he also taught at Haverford College, University of Denver, University of Colorado at Denver, and Charles University (Czech Republic). He also has professional experience working as a correspondent for the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC Arabic) and Israel Broadcasting





Authority (IBA), covering Israeli and Palestinian affairs.

Dr. Ibrahim is known for his involvement with the Ukrainian Working Group alongside Professors Goeckel and Hart, and their programming on the Ukraine conflict. Dr. Ibrahim has been actively involved with our college's Model UN organization, and has attended United Nations Conferences. These include the conference on Climate Change and Human Rights in Doha, Qatar in February 2023 and the commemoration of the 75th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in Geneva, Switzerland in December 2023.

Dr. Pressman is an Associate Professor of Political Science and Director of Middle East Studies at the University of Connecticut. Dr. Pressman studies international relations, protests, the Arab-Israeli conflict, Middle East politics, and U.S. foreign policy. He co-founded and co-directs the Crowd Counting Consortium, an event counting project that has tallied and made publicly available data on all manner of protests in the United States since 2017. Dr. Pressman received his PhD in political science from MIT and previously worked at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. His most recent book is The sword is not enough: Arabs, Israelis, and the limits of military force, which questions the over-reliance on military force and highlights the negative military and political consequences such as greater insecurity.

Dr. Pressman has written two other books and has also published many articles and letters in the wider press such as the New York Times, Washington Post, the Boston Review, the Washington Quarterly and ForeignAffairs.com. He has enjoyed speaking to community groups – often about Israel-Palestine – including at public libraries, eldercare facilities, faith communities, schools, a debate camp, and (virtually) to the Tucson (AZ) Great Decisions Association. We thank him for joining us!

Our department encourages all of our students to organize programming surrounding topics and themes they are interested in, and we look forward to providing resources to turn future ideas into action.

By Lexi Savoie, '24 | On May 17th, 2024, Dr. Anand Rao spoke at St Antony's College through the Oxford School of Global and Area Studies. He discussed how the coronavirus pandemic suddenly closed Japan's doors to inbound tourism and migration in the early 2020s, but those doors were never going to be closed indefinitely. The pandemic, originating in Wuhan, revealed the centrality of China in particular to Japan's immigration dilemma. China's transformation in

the twenty-first century into an economic superpower has been an understudied possible motivation for Japan's government to liberalize the country's immigration regime as a tool for retaining influence in the Indo-Pacific region and beyond.

St. Antony's College is a constituent college of Oxford that was founded in 1950 and specializes in the study of international relations, economics, and politics. St Antony's College is home to the Nissan Institute of Japanese Studies, one of the world's leading academic centers for the study of all topics pertaining to Japan.

Dr. Rao is an assistant professor of Political Science and International Relations and his work has been published by Asian Politics & Policy, the Japan Studies Association Journal, and Lexington Books. He is a member of Cohort 5 of the U.S.-Japan Network for the Future. He completed his Ph.D. at the University of Virginia in 2015 and joined the faculty at SUNY Geneseo in that same year. At Geneseo, he regularly teaches an introductory comparative politics class as well as higherlevel courses on the topics of East Asian politics, terrorism and national security, and democratic peace theory. This spring semester, he has been passionately teaching a Senior Seminar course on Comparative Politics in which the second half of the term has focused largely

on immigration policy and issues.

Dr. Rao was an Academic Visitor at St Antony's College during the Michaelmas Term in 2023. He received a sabbatical for the Fall 2023 semester which ran from October 8th to December 2nd. While there, Dr. Rao did research for an ongoing project that analyzes geopolitical factors influencing recent Japanese immigration policy. He attended weekly seminars that featured talks by Japan experts based in Europe, discussed his research

with faculty members at the Nissan Institute, and was able to access the resources at Oxford's renowned Bodleian Japanese Library.

Professor Rao hopes to eventually write a monograph as part of the Palgrave-St Antony's Series of publications. While on sabbatical, he enjoyed traveling by train during weekends in Britain and was able to visit many places, including Bristol, Cardiff, Coventry, Newcastle, Edinburgh, and



St Andrews. Our department hopes Dr. Rao enjoys speaking at this seminar and is proud of his ongoing research and contributions to our department!

#### 2024 Election Panel



Professor Hanna Brant organized a panel leading up to the November 2024 general election to inform students of the stakes of last year's presidential race. On the panel, Professor Jeff Koch spoke on the importance of the race for domestic politics, while Professor Anand Rao and Professor Joshua Turner highlighted the global implications of the outcome of the U.S. presidential election. Students, faculty, and staff from across the college attended. "I really enjoyed being able to listen to the speakers and being able to just soak in their expertise," wrote one political science major in response to the event. "I loved the format of having them each speak on their areas of interest and then allowing for student questions to follow. I thought it was great and I'm so glad I went." # Generous Gift Supports New Professorship in Political Science and International Relations

By Keith Walters, '11 | Mary Houlne DeWeaver, '71 and Kevin DeWeaver, '72 unexpectedly left more than \$530,000 to the departments of sociology and political science and international relations.

"Mary and Kevin DeWeaver expressed their support for Geneseo over the years with modest gifts to The Fund for Geneseo, athletics, and scholarships," says Ellen Leverich, '90, vice president for college advancement. "They did not notify us that they planned to include us in their estate. This gift of more than half a million dollars is a testament to the undergraduate experience they had at Geneseo, and we are so grateful for their foresight and generosity."

Little is known about the DeWeavers outside of their professional networks, as they lived an intensely private life and have no surviving family. What can be gleaned from those who interacted with them is that the couple's love story began at Geneseo.

The DeWeavers were both only children. Kevin grew up on a dairy farm in Western New York, and Mary traded the hustle and bustle of New York City for the serenity of the Finger Lakes. According to a close friend, the DeWeavers often took long walks

around campus and throughout the region—a habit they kept late into their lives.

Following Geneseo, the DeWeavers moved south as Kevin pursued his Ph.D in social work at the University of Florida. He subsequently landed a job at the University of Georgia, where he served as a professor and the PhD program director in the School of Social Work for more than 26 years. Kevin's affinity for undergraduate teaching may have stemmed from his time at Geneseo, where, according to a former colleague, he "felt liberated and free for the first time in his young adult life." Mary was an avid reader who enjoyed volunteering in her community and traveling around the country with Kevin to academic conferences.

When Kevin passed away in 2011, Mary was "never really the same," according to those closest to her, but that's not where the DeWeavers' love story ends. The couple's bequest to Geneseo will ensure that their name and memory will serve Geneseo students and faculty for generations.

With their gift, the Department of Political Science and International Relations has established the

DeWeaver Professorship, which will support a research-focused faculty member annually, prioritizing junior faculty seeking continuing appointment and promotion.

"The professorship will allow faculty the time to engage more deeply with their research, work with their students on research projects, and publish the results of their research," says Karleen West, chair of political science and international relations. "The DeWeaver Professorship will also support hiring long-term adjunct faculty who are excellent instructors and teach classes that our students need to graduate."

# Invited Speakers on Gun Control and the Constitution



On Tuesday, October 22, 2024, the Department of Political Science and International Relations welcomed Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Political Science at SUNY Cortland to deliver a talk on "Gun Law History: Separating Fact from

Fiction." Dr. Spitzer is the author of The Politics of Gun Control. Spitzer is often quoted and interviewed by American and international news outlets, including The Today Show, Good Morning America, ABC Nightly News, PBS's News Hour, MSNBC's All In With Chris Hayes, CNN, NPR's Fresh Air with Terry Gross, The Diane Rehm Show and 1A (NPR), the BBC, CBC, NHK, Der Spiegel, the New York Times, the Washington Post, the Los Angeles Times, the Wall Street Journal, USA Today, Time Magazine, Newsweek, Slate, and Politico, among others. He

also appeared in the documentary films *Guns and Mothers* (PBS, 2003), *Under the Gun* (Katie Couric Film Company, Epix, 2016), *The Price of Freedom* (Flatbush Pictures/Tribeca Films, 2021). He has testified before Congress on several occasions.

On Thursday, October 10, 2024, we welcomed Marc Landy, Professor of Political Science at Boston College. Based his new book co-authored with Dennis Hale, Keeping the Republic: A Defense of



American Constitutionalism, Professor Landy's talk will aim to counter the increasingly fashionable diatribes against the Constitution by law professors, journalists and political scientists who claim it is "broken," "obsolete," paralyzing, irredeemable etc. The talk's larger purpose is to explain why the Constitution is especially well constructed to enable America to resist the threats to the survival of republican democracy posed by the problems this modern state must face, amongst which are massive size and religious, ethnic, racial and ideological diversity.

Dr. Landy has a B.A. from Oberlin College and a Ph.D Government from Harvard University. He was the recipient of the 2009 Teaching Award chosen by the student members of the Boston College Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. He is the author (with Sidney Milkis) of *Presidential Greatness* (Kansas U.

Press, 2000), The Environmental Protection Agency From Nixon to Clinton: Asking the Wrong Questions (with Marc Roberts and Stephen Thomas) (Oxford University Press 1994), and the textbook American Government: Enduring Principles, Critical Choices (Cambridge University Press, 2019), now in its fourth edition. He is an editor of Creating Competitive Markets: The Politics and Economics of Regulatory Reform (Brookings Institution Press, 2007); Seeking the Center: Politics and Policymaking at the New Century (Georgetown University Press, 2001); and The New Politics of Public Policy (Johns Hopkins University Press, 1995), and he has authored popular as well as scholarly articles on the Presidency and executive power, federalism, environmental regulation, the nature of American citizenship, and Patrick Deneen's critique of liberal democracy.

She has a B.A. from Ewha Womans University, an M.A from Korea's University in South Korea, and a Ph.D. in Public Administration from Florida State University with a graduate certificate in Emergency Management and Homeland Security. Her research areas focus on nonprofit and public management with a specific focus on disaster management. Dr. Yang was motivated to explore this field of research by the various experiences she encountered during her undergraduate studies in Seoul, South Korea. Throughout the duration of her undergraduate degree she noticed housing shortages that
