

For most people, it is a natural tendency to congregate with those who have similar physical characteristics, athletic abilities, temperaments, and/or cultural/ethnic backgrounds. This tendency, however, for some individuals, creates a barrier to one of the most important aspects of the college experience; learning to understand who you are as an

individual and the role that one can play in the world unless that exploration occurs.

This is especially true as many students go through the process of examining whether or not they will choose to become associated with the various clubs, organizations, sports teams and/or fraternities or sororities that are available in college. For some students, the relationships developed through these associations are keys to creating bonds with peers that can be both meaningful and long-lasting. For others, these associations are a continuation of experiences that existed prior

Where long-term problems can develop, however, is when students limit that development and decide to remain in cliques that do not challenge them to become a better person and member of the campus community than when they arrived. It is the students who take full advantage of the opportunities to expand their horizons that truly embrace the beauty of the higher education experience.

What attracted you to SUNY Geneseo and the AOP Department?

AOP Tutoring in Fall 2008: Things to Know

TUTORING = a supplement and a means of assistance to your learning.

Tutors can:

- Provide clarification and increase understanding
- Facilitate practice of course material
- Provide test/quiz review
- Answer questions
- Model and show how to use effective study skills
- Encourage motivation
- Assist you in improving your GPA/grade in a course
- Help you to reach your goals and feel good about yourself

Tutors cannot:

- Teach you the class or make up for absences
- Do your homework
- Give you an A

***Please keep in mind that tutoring sessions cannot replace your own studying time. Sessions enhance and reinforce all the hard work that you are doing on your own!

HOW TO SIGN UP:

1. Stop into the AOP office in

Blake C and fill out a Tutor Request Form (as early in the semester as possible).

2. Return the application to an AOP secretary or Ms. Walker.

3. As soon as a tutor is found, he/she will contact you via e-mail or campus phone (check them often!) in order to set up specific days/times to meet (2 meetings/week). You may

also be notified of walk-in or small group tutoring times. * (If you have not heard anything after one month– please contact the Tutorial Services Coordinator)

4. Be open to individual, small group, and walk-in tutoring. Also use campus resources such as professors, TA's, the MLC, the Writing Center and tutoring in major departments. Utilizing a number of different

resources is beneficial to your learning!

5. Follow through and use this help that is being offered!

Reminders:

Three NS's or Multiple Cancellations = The Loss of Tutoring

(NS=a no show or the missing of a session without any or proper advanced notice.)

Cancellation Procedures:

1. Notify tutor hours ahead of time (preferably a day in advance) by first calling or e-mailing him/her.

2. Look for a confirmation message from your tutor showing they received your call/e-mail.

3. If you do not hear from your tutor, you must call the AOP office to inform us of your cancellation and to ask that we attempt to notify your tutor.

4. Re-schedule the session.
