

Student Teacher Fact Sheet

The staff of the Department of Career Development has a genuine interest in helping you make a smooth transition from campus to career. When you're off campus student teaching for an entire semester, it's sometimes difficult to tend to college and personal business, so this handout is designed to clarify some of the issues that have been of interest to student teachers in the past.

The Following Are Required for New York State Initial Certification:

New York State Teacher Certification Examinations (NYSTCE)

Candidates seeking **Initial** certification must successfully pass the ALST (Academic Literacy Skills Test), the EAS (Educating All Students Test), the edTPA in your content area and a CST (Content Specialty Test) in your certification area. A separate handout with additional information about testing is available from the Department of Career Development.

The Geneseo campus is typically a site for all 6 NYSTCE test dates (September, November, February, April, June and July) and advance registration is required. You now also have the option of completing all but your CST through Computer Based Testing (CBT) in locations throughout New York State and beyond. ****Other states may have different testing requirements.** For example, certain parts of the PRAXIS series are required in some states. If you're thinking of relocating out-of-state, you should contact state Department of Education offices well in advance of beginning your job search to identify certification regulations and application procedures.

Applying for New York State Teacher Certification

The College recommends that you apply for your Teacher Certification no later than the middle of the semester you expect to graduate (i.e., the term you complete all requirements, including student teaching). The Certification Application is on the TEACH system within the NYSED website. **Please first read our instructions**, found under "Advisement" at <http://dean.geneseo.edu> (left-hand menu). Fingerprinting

Education Law 305, the Schools Against Violence in Education (SAVE), requires that applicants for teaching and administrative certification and prospective employees of covered schools (school districts, charter schools, BOCES) undergo a fingerprint-supported criminal history background check. Fingerprint cards can be obtained from the School of Education, South Hall 218, and should be available at any local school district, charter school, BOCES, and other institutions of higher education with teacher preparation programs. Other Typical Student Teacher Issues:

Placement File Services

When seeking a teaching job, you will almost always be required to provide letters of recommendation to prospective employers. School administrators particularly favor letters from cooperating teachers and supervising faculty. The Department of Career Development is pleased to announce a new partnership with Interfolio, a premier provider of web-based credential processing services. Teacher Recruitment Day (TRD)

Each spring a recruitment fair is held for prospective teachers from eleven Rochester area colleges, including Geneseo. School districts from New York and many other states interview students in a daylong event held in Rochester. This event is held in mid-April each year. Graduate Record Examinations (GRE's)

Some graduate schools require the GRE General Test as one criterion for admission. The GRE General Test is offered as a computer-based test (CBT) year-round at numerous sites across the country including two in the Rochester area. Registration information is available at www.ets.org/gre.
