The Division of Academic Affairs at SUNY Geneseo is organized into 2 schools and 18 academic departments which provide a variety of majors, minors, and concentrations for our students. The division also includes several support units that complement our academic programs, enhance programmatic study, and ensure the development and completion of degree programs.

Faculty Appointments to Administrative Roles

Two Geneseo faculty members have accepted administrative appointments within the Office of the Provost to support academic initiatives.

Associate Professor of Geography James Kernan was named Faculty Fellow effective this summer. In this half-time professional and leadership development position, Jim will work closely with the Academic Affairs team on strategic initiatives, with a primary focus on developing a new interdisciplinary Sustainability Studies program (housed in Geography). This initiative will integrate the three pillars of sustainability including social, economic, and environmental justice. As he works to generate an inclusive and vibrant new program, Jim will collaborate with faculty, chairs, deans, staff, and students across campus – as well as off-campus partners.



In addition to his teaching and research, Jim serves as Sponsored Professor for the SUNY Geneseo-Letchworth State Park Partnership and the advisor for the Geneseo FORCES (Friends of Recreation, Conservation, and Environmental Stewardship) Club. In 2015, he received the Drs. Carol and Michael Harter Endowment Faculty Mentoring Award, and in 2018, the Outstanding Commitment to Geneseo's Values Civic Engagement Award.



Melanie Blood, professor in the Departments of English and Music, and coordinator of the Women's and Gender Studies Program, has been appointed to the full-time position of interim associate provost for assessment and curriculum.

Her responsibilities include coordinating campus assessment of student learning outcomes, ensuring compliance with state and SUNY regulations, and overseeing curricular development and approval. This position is also central to the core work of facilitating proven practices in assessment and assembling essential materials for the institutional self-study as the College prepares for re-accreditation by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education in 2022.

Melanie will work closely with the Committee on Undergraduate Curricula of the College Senate, the General Education Committee, and the Curricular Design Working Group to create sound curricular policies and ensure compliance with new and existing ones as we move forward. Additional responsibilities include service on the Strategic Planning Group and College Assessment Committee, supervision of the Office of the Registrar, and oversight of compliance with SUNY and New York State Department of Education policies.

Melanie received a SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching in 2011. In addition to her important leadership of the Women's and Gender Studies Program, she also coordinates SUNY Geneseo's participation in the Rochester Fringe Festival and advises several student groups.

The College thanks Bill Harrison, lecturer in the Department of English, who had served in this role since January 2018 and returned this fall to the teaching faculty.

Student Retention WIG (Wildly Important Goal)

Since its inception in December 2017, the WIG team along with others across campus, has made student retention its main focus by working strategically toward the goal of increasing the retention rate of first-year first-time-to-college student to second-year student from 86% to 88% by October 2019. A new first year seminar is being piloted, professional training has been programed, and various other new initiatives have been developed. Introducing Academic Affairs New Faculty and Staff



Steve Brookstein joins Geneseo as the VanArsdale Chair in Entrepreneurship. Brookstein previously spent four years as an adjunct in entrepreneurship at the Rochester Institute of Technology; he has also taught at Hobart and William Smith, Nazareth College, and the Fashion Institute of Technology. His research interests include telecommunications, internal/external communications, new business development, and sales and marketing. Brookstein earned his M.B.A. from the Wharton School of Business, University of Pennsylvania, and his B.S. from Temple University.

Mackenzie Gerringer is a new assistant professor in the biology department, where she will be teaching Marine Biology, Science Communication, and Animal Physiology this fall. Previously, Gerringer has taught at the University of Washington, the University of Hawai'i at Manoa, and the Oberschule an der Hermannsburg

in Bremen, Germany, as a Fulbright Teaching Fellow. Courses taught have included Introductory Oceanography, Introduction to Biology, Multicellular Life, Ecology and Evolution, Comparative Physiology, Biological Oceanography, Marine Biology, Deep-Sea Biology, Biology of Fishes, Animal Physiology, Life in Extreme Environments, and Scientific Writing. Her research interests include deep-sea trenches and deep-sea fishes. Gerringer earned her B.A. from Whitman College and her doctorate from the University of Hawai'i at Manoa, then went on to conduct postdoctoral research as a teaching fellow at Friday Harbor Labs, University of Washington. In her spare time, Gerringer enjoys knitting, reading, travel, and theater.



Claire Gravelin returns to Geneseo as an assistant professor of psychology. In addition to Geneseo in 2016-17, she has taught at Franklin Pierce University and the University of Kansas, where she earned both her master's and doctorate. She received her B.S. from the College at Brockport. Previously, Gravelin has taught Introduction to Psychology; Psychology of Gender; Statistics for the Behavioral Sciences; Psychology and the Law; Social Psychology; Research Methods; Stereotyping, Prejudice, and Discrimination Across Cultures; and Psychology and Social Issues. Her work predominantly explores the causes and consequences of the marginalization of women, largely as it relates to victim-blaming in sexual assault and women's under-representation in stereotypically masculine domains. In her free time, Gravelin enjoys obsessing over her two cats, playing volleyball, and hosting game nights along with her husband Jake.



Thomas Osburn joins the physics and astronomy department as an assistant professor. He earned both his master's and doctorate from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and his bachelor's from the Georgia Institute of Technology. 


bowling, board games, video games, reading, cooking, and exploring the new-to-her western New York region.

2019-20 Presidential Scholars

Presidential Scholars at SUNY Geneseo are top-achieving members of the senior class who exemplify Geneseo's institutional values and serve as ambassadors for the College.

To be considered for the honor, a student must hold a minimum grade point average of 3.6, have earned at least 70 credits (at least 24 of which at Geneseo), and plan to graduate in May or August of the following year. Additionally, the student must demonstrate academic achievement across the curriculum, affirming Geneseo's values of excellence and innovation with experiences such as major directed studies, substantial overseas studies, independent research, conference presentations, significant artistic projects and/or record of creativity, and demonstrate Geneseo's value of integrity in academic and community life.

Thirteen students were selected as Presidential Scholars for the 2019-20 academic year. Director of Galleries Cynthia Hawkins Earns Doctorate Degree

Eight years in the making, Cynthia Hawkins, director of galleries, can now add three more letters after her name: Ph.D.

On September 1, the University of Buffalo conferred upon her a doctor of philosophy degree in American Studies. With this achievement, Hawkins feels she's come "full circle," combining her first love of history with her passion for art.



"I love to learn, and I wanted my Ph.D. - but not in art," noted Hawkins, who also holds an M.F.A. from the Mt. Royal Graduate School of Painting at the Maryland Institute College of Art and an M.A. in Museum Professions from Seton Hall University.

"I've always had an interest in history," she added. "I want to know why things are the way they are, and while my Ph.D. in American studies is about history, it's also about thinking that art ... cannot be what it is without considering its place in history."

"I think it's important when exhibiting artwork in the galleries to extend not just the meaning of the art object but to place it within its historical setting," she added. Cynthia curates works of art for both the Lockhart Gallery and the Bertha V.B. Lederer Gallery.
