He also has authored an article titled *The Effect of Consociationalism on Democracy in Nigeria* for the departmental journal and presented a paper on minimum wage during Great Day 2018. James, past president of Geneseo College Republicans, has interned in New York's 27th congressional district and volunteered with campaigns for local state candidates. He is a member of the Sigma Iota Rho International Relations honor society and a recipient of the department's Ambassador Apartments Outstanding Junior Award. Among his educational experiences, James has studied abroad in Cadiz, Spain and attended the American Enterprise Institute's Summer Honors Academy in Washington D.C. He enjoys hiking, exercising and spending time with his Sigma Alpha Mu fraternity brothers.
