Principal criteria for the award are: the project advances the teaching and learning of sociology. Up to \$2,500. Substantive areas include (but are not limited to) the study of individual and group decision-making, political institutions (appointed or elected), attitude and preference formation and expression, electoral processes and voting, public administration, and public policy. The Security and Preparedness (SAP) Program supports basic scientific research that advances knowledge and understanding of issues broadly related to global and national security. Research proposals are evaluated on the criteria of intellectual merit and broader impacts; the proposed projects are expected to be theoretically motivated, conceptually precise, methodologically rigorous, and empirically oriented. Substantive areas include (but are not limited to) international relations, global and national security, human security, political violence, state stability, conflict processes, regime transition, international and comparative political economy, and peace science. Small Grants have a \$10,000 lifetime limit. Pipe line grants are for Associate professors who have been in the rank for less than seven years are eligible for grants of up to \$50,000. Trustee Grants are generally capped at \$175,000, including 15% indirect costs, over a two-year period. Presidential Awards are capped at \$35,000 (no indirect costs).
