2019 AOP Summer Scholars Program



The 2019 AOP Summer Scholars Program started like it has for so many years. We had students arrive at Geneseo on July 7th, where they checked in, met their summer roommate, and they listen to the AOP co-coordinators, Mrs. Flossie Stephens and Mrs. Courtney Havens, tell them what was expected of them and of AOP. These students came from all over the state of New York. Some had only been living in the United States for a few years. They come from cities as big as New York City and towns that are so small that most people have never heard of them.

Our peer mentors arrived a little over a week before the AOP students arrived. Under the leadership of Mr. Nikko Garmendiz, the Senior Peer Mentor, and Mr. Randall Lombardi, the Senior Peer Tutor, the peer mentors prepared Livingston Hall and the peer mentors to best serve our incoming students for the four week program.

The AOP students were told about the challenges that were to come. They knew that they would be taking an intense reading and writing comprehension class called INTD 170, followed by one of three core classes, which were Statistics, Chemistry, or Pre-Calc. The AOP Summer Scholars Program is designed to challenge the students, but more importantly, it prepares them for their fall semester at SUNY Geneseo. It is a challenge both in the classroom, and out. For many of the students, this was their first time away from their families for an extended amount of time. On top of being away, the AOP challenge is intense. There aren't too many times in your life where someone, or in this case, a group of caring counselors, peer mentors, tutors and professors, are consistently looking at how you function as a student and telling you, almost daily, what you are doing well, and where you need to improve. More importantly, they gave students the resources they need to become better.

The AOP students, under the guidance of the Milne Library staff, did research on world issues, and then did poster presentations where they talked about what they discovered about many of the world issues. This presentation helps the students understand how to do research, work as a team, and it also gives them exposure to the entire campus. The Milne staff has received nationwide recognition for their guidance with the AOP students during the summer program.

Every year, we talk with our graduating Seniors and ask them, "What was the most memorable part of your time in AOP?", and the AOP Summer Scholars Program is constantly mentioned as the most memorable. The summer experience is what truly transforms you into an AOP student. It has become a right of passage. Thousands of opportunity program students have gone through a similar summer program either at SUNY Geneseo or at another New York State college, or university. They all met the challenge and they were better for it.

On the final evening of the AOP Summer Scholars Program, we have an end of summer celebration where we recognize those students who really excelled in their classes. My favorite award is the "most improved" award. We see students who have gone from truly not understanding what is happening in their classroom and maybe even failing their first quiz, or exam, and then by pure grit and determination they utilize all the services that AOP has to offer and work hard to become better students. It's always a pleasure seeing their faces light up and having their peers cheer for them.

On August 1st, 2019, the summer scholars program is over. The students meet with their counselors one last time. The counselors let them know what to expect in the next few weeks and what they need to do once they start the semester. Then around noon, after many, many hugs, the majority of them are gone. The campus gets really quiet. The AOP staff starts to relax. Many of us take some time off and get ready for the semester to start. The most interesting part of the end of the summer program is that as soon as it ends, we start to prepare for the next one. I am not kidding. The work is never ending, but it is so important.

The McNair Program & Application Season

The Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Achievement Program, also known as the McNair Scholar Program, is a program designed to prepare first-generation students with financial need (i.e., low-income) and underrepresented students for doctoral education upon completion of their undergraduate careers. The program provides participants with "research internships, faculty mentors, opportunities to present and publish results of their research, undergraduate teaching experience, and assistance with applying for graduate school" (Council of Graduate Schools, 2012). SUNY Geneseo's McNair Scholar Program is now accepting applications through its "early-bird" cycle! Apply online! The application deadline is Monday, October 7! Recommendation letters are due October 14.

If you are interested in learning about the McNair Scholars Program, you can attend one of our information sessions (see dates and times below)! The session will be held in Sturges Hall, Room 122B. If you are thinking about applying, here are ways you can strengthen your application: Talk extensively about research interest and Ph.D. attainment. If you are looking into just masters or professional doctoral degrees (i.e., MD, JD, Ed.D, etc.), this program may not be for you.

- Had some rough semesters? Let us know what was going on. No need to get too
 personal, but having insight on what you were going through will allow us to understand your circumstances some more.
- Letters of recommendations: make sure to get at least two letters of recommendation. Your references should be faculty, specifically faculty who can speak about you academic achievement and potential.
- Apply before the deadline!
- Edit your application!

The Program Development team will create, facilitate and coordinate several activities and events centered around the "Five Pearls" or principals of WLI, which are: leadership, support, networking, service and advocacy. These activities and events include:

Woman to Woman sessions – informal sessions for women to gather and discuss issues pertinent to their experiences as well as get to know each other and form new friendships. This year, Woman to Woman sessions will be taking place on Fridays from 5 pm to 6 pm in the College Union Fireside Lounge. These sessions are open to all women on campus, not just participants in WLI, so please feel free to join us and take part in these fun and thought-provoking discussions and activities.
