
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Accessible Instructional Materials (AIM) Training

Overview of the Training

Providing students with disabilities with AIM can be a fairly complex process, involving multiple decision points along the way.

The AIM training has been developed to provide interested stakeholders with the background knowledge and tools necessary to make informed decisions about AIM.

Key Points of the Training

The key points within the training include:

- ⇒ all students can benefit from AIM;
- ⇒ New York State (NYS) regulations require that students with disabilities receive AIM in a timely manner;
- ⇒ there are multiple sources of AIM, but only certain students can access certain sources; and
- ⇒ the process for obtaining AIM depends on the type of AIM a student with a disability requires.
