



## Geneseo's New Curriculum: Advising Guide for General Education

As we enter the third decade of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, Geneseo's faculty have framed a new approach to general education that speaks to the values of our students. Courses should have meaning. Courses should expand our interests. Courses should provoke critical thinking to solve problems at both a local and international level. A *Geneseo Education for a Connected World* doesn't "prepare" students for living in a global society. It invites you to be the change makers in a world that truly needs your help. Yes, at Geneseo, you still choose a major, but with the "Connected World" gen ed program, you will create, write, analyze, and come up with solutions now, not later.

<b>Geneseo Education for a Connected World</b>		<b>Credits</b> 30-41
Students will complete 30-41 credits (7-10 courses) in General Education. Although some courses may count for both GE and another area, your transcript must include 30 or more General Education credits. I.e., you may exceed the credit requirements in any area to reach at least 30.		
<b>COMMUNICATION</b> – can overlap with your major		
Basic Communication (1 course)	INTD 105, HONR 101 writing course, or equivalent transfer composition course.	3-4 Cr.
Language other than English (0-2 courses)	Through 102 (e.g., SPAN 102, AMLS 102)	0-8 Cr.
<b>SCIENTIFIC LITERACY</b> —can overlap with your major		
Laboratory Science (1 lecture course + lab) (Cannot "double dip" with Participation in a Global Society course)	Approved lecture and laboratory course.	4-5 Cr.
Quantitative/Symbolic Reasoning (1 course)	A math or quantitative methods course.	3-4 Cr.
<b>PARTICIPATION IN A GLOBAL SOCIETY (PGS)</b>		
All five PGS sub-areas are required, but you must choose at least one from each of these learning areas: <b>Arts, Humanities, Social Science.</b>		
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Only one course from your primary major can also be used in this section.</li><li>You are permitted one "double dipping" of courses within the five PGS areas (so you must have at least four unique courses in Global Society)</li></ul>		
<b>APPLIED LEARNING</b>		
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>At least one Participation in a Global Society course must have Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEISJ) and racial/social justice content.</li><li>Every student will complete an "Applied Learning" experience – this might be in a course or outside the curriculum. Consult with your Academic Advisor.</li></ul>		

<b>Participation in a Global Society Area</b>	<b>Learning outcomes:</b>
<b>Diversity, Pluralism, Power</b>	Students understand (i) the diversity of identities that characterizes the United States; (ii) the ways in which systems of power lead to different outcomes for members of diverse groups; (iii) the reasoning and impact of one's personal beliefs and actions; and (iv) how to participate effectively in pluralistic contexts (e.g., by communicating and collaborating across difference). (3-4 credits)
<b>World Cultures &amp; Values</b>	Students (i) understand systems of value and meaning as embodied in one or more cultures from different regions of the world; and (ii) assess interconnections among/across local and global systems and cultures. Courses in this category engage extensively with the past and/or present in cultures outside Europe and the United States (though they may also engage with content from cultures located within those regions, e.g., Native/Indigenous cultures). (3-4 credits)
<b>Contemporary Global Challenges</b>	Students (i) understand local and global networks, systems, and interdependencies; and (ii) apply global perspectives in addressing challenges and solving problems. (3-4 credits)
<b>Creativity &amp; Innovation</b>	Students understand and reflect on (i) creative expression, art, and invention as foundational to culture and inclusive societal betterment; and (ii) the relationship between individual creative work or innovation and wider contexts. (3-4 credits)
<b>Sustainability</b>	Students understand and reflect on (i) the environmental, economic, and/or social dimensions of sustainability and how they relate to each other; and (ii) how these three dimensions shape our changing planet. (3-4 credits)
